

February is Pet Dental Health Month!



For most people, daily brushing of teeth and regular visits to the dentist have become the acceptable way to keep teeth and gums healthy. It is now being recognized that the same applies to pets.

According to vets, more than 80% of dogs show some signs of gum disease by the age of five. Not only does this cause pain and loss of teeth but if it is not treated, bacteria entering the blood stream can cause diseases like liver and kidney and even heart failure.

Vets say that bad breath is the easiest way to tell if your pet has gum disease. But you should also be on the lookout for a yellow-brown crust of tartar around the gum line, red and inflamed gums, bleeding or receding gums and loose teeth.

If you think your hound suffers from gum disease visit your vet who will advise you on the best course of action. A thorough scaling and polishing and regular check ups may be recommended. Between visits, vets advise consistent practice of oral hygiene by brushing your hound's teeth and feeding special dental food.



A Night With The Duchess (aka Leashing Your Hounds)

The night started like most other nights for us. I got home from work about 5:00pm. Rox had arrived a couple minutes earlier and was already in the backyard with the “girls” who were busy relieving themselves after faithfully holding it for nine hours. The “girls” consist of our two retired Greyhounds, Emme and Tessa (formerly known as Brenda) and our little Pit Bull terrier mix, Madalyn.

Emme was our first Grey Girl. She is very sweet, a little high-maintenance, and has been with us just over five years. Tessa joined Emme in the good life about three and a half years ago after a decent career as a racer. Tessa is the Clown Princess of the family. She is goofy, lovable, but not terribly bright. Maddie, once abandoned and in search of a home quickly adopted the attitude of her big Grey

step-sisters, play hard, rest harder, with four feet in the air whenever possible. Maddie has become the perfect foil for Tessa as Emme slows down with age. We also have five wonderful cats that possess varying degrees of tolerance for the “girls”, but generally everyone gets along quite well.

Our evening routine includes our W-A-L-K, spelled, never spoken, before dinner. The girls” long ago tired of walking around the block. So every night (and twice on weekends) we load them into Roxanne’s mini-van for a trip to a local park where there are always interesting new smells and occasionally dogs to sniff and greet. Normally the van loading takes place inside our garage, from the laundry room door. However, the garage had become so full of stuff this summer that we had been leaving the van in the driveway and letting the girls run out the front door and hop in for their trip to the park.

Now, we are very, very aware that Greyhounds should never, ever be off leash. The Krautbauers, upon Emme’s adoption and in all the literature we read before and after, drilled this into our head. For years they never were. Unfortunately we had gotten a little lax with

this as the girls mellowed with age, letting them run out the front door to greet guests, etc. So, we didn’t think letting them run from the house to the van would be a problem, and until that awful night, it wasn’t. They always run straight to the already open door. Tessa, usually with one of her stuffed animal “babies” in her mouth.

Rox and I usually take the girls for their W-A-L-K together, but that night Rox had a bad cold and wanted to rest so I offered to take them myself. I put their collars on, opened the door and off they went racing to the van in the driveway. Being Alpha, Tessa usually has to be first in and out of every door. That particular night, however, Tessa paused for a minute on her way to the van, went potty, sniffed some newly fallen leaves and then spotted a woman walking a little Pomeranian in the street in front of our house. I immediately saw Tessa’s eyes fixate on the woman and her dog. I was trapped between Tessa out in the yard, and the other two girls in the open van who had also seen the little dog by now. I wasn’t worried about Tessa hurting the little dog, rather just scaring the poor woman with her over-exuberance. Tessa had tested out as being “low-prey” and she never showed an interest in any of our cats or other dogs. (Bunnies are a different story, but she can tell the difference.)

Within seconds, Tess had the little Pom in her mouth just like one of her little stuffed “babies”. I’m sure her intent was to scoop the little dog up and bring it to the van for our ride to the park. Damage would have probably been minimal if she had. Unfortunately, the little dog’s owner had a hold of the leash and a tug of war was in progress when I got to the scene. All I could think to do was give Tessa a kick in the side, which I did. She dropped the Pom and I tried to dive on top of the little dog.

However, the feisty little Pom also wanted a piece of Tessa and scrambled away from me and an ugly scene ensued as my two other dogs joined the fray. I was sprawled in the street trying to grab the Pom while yelling and kicking at my own dogs, all the while the woman on the other end of the leash, who I had never seen before, was screaming for help. I finally got hold of the Pom and Roxanne’s attention. She managed to get our dogs in the house while I quickly ushered Pom and owner into the van and took off for the Emergency Veterinary Clinic in Oakdale.

I discovered on the way that the woman is the sister-in-law of our neighbors and was visiting for the day with her husband from their home on the Canadian border. The Pom, whose name I finally learned was Duchess, didn’t look too bad as I drove as quickly as

possible through the remaining rush hour traffic. She had a little blood around her neck, but she wasn't bleeding profusely and she was still pretty feisty so I thought maybe it would be OK. However, once the ER vet started to examine her closely, he knew the damage was serious and didn't know if she would survive. The woman's husband arrived with our neighbor a few minutes later. Of course I felt as terrible as a dog owner ever could as I sat in the waiting room. I told them we'd cover all expenses, even when the vet gave us an estimate of \$1200.00 to \$1875.00 for exploratory surgery and repairs. Duchess's owner gave me a chance to withdraw my offer, but I couldn't. I gave the vet's assistant a credit card that we had just managed to pay off. I then left for home, not knowing if my carelessness had resulted in the death of another family's beloved pet.

Duchess survived several hours worth of surgery that involved the re-sectioning of her bowels and intestines, but she was not out of the woods. She would make it through the night and we arranged for the wonderful doctors and technicians at the Cottage Grove Animal Hospital to care for her during the day. I was very mad at Tessa when I finally got home, but I knew the fault was mine. I made it through that night only with the help of several powerful sleeping pills.

Well, Duchess survived and should be just fine. Her parents' one day trip to the Twin Cities turned into a week long stay. Our credit card debt increased by a total of \$2500.00, but it was worth every penny to keep the little girl alive. I can't even imagine if she hadn't survived. We want to share this story with our fellow Greyhound parents to reinforce the need to always leash your dogs when not in a fenced in area. As we discovered, it isn't just for their protection.

When my family and I decided to adopt a greyhound, we knew we were doing a good thing by giving an ex-racer a home. We knew that greyhounds are great companions, but what we didn't know is how much we were about to learn. Lily came to our home this past August. She was a bounce back with a questionable past. But Lily knew a lot and had some lessons for us. The first lesson came when I decided to gate her in my room. I came home to a 're-decorated' bedroom. I didn't know that my bed skirt needed to be ripped up and thrown away, but Lily showed me. And, I have to agree, the blue one looks much better. She retired as an interior decorator and decided that couch life was more to her liking.

The next lesson we all learned is that barking is so passé. Before long Lily had our little pomapoo, Lu, rooing right along with her. Lucy agrees, singing is much more fun.

Lily taught us all sorts of little things along the way, like if you stand in front of someone long enough and give them your best puppy dog eyes, eventually you will get a treat; and, always to remember to make the first move. If someone isn't looking at you, put your head under their hand and you'll get noticed.

Lily showed my friends at the dog park just how fast a greyhound can run and that sometimes you have to let others 'win.' She also taught us that no matter what the size, color or shape, we can all be friends.

We had some really hard lessons to learn too. When Lily was diagnosed with degenerative disc disease, her prognosis was not good. Her x-ray looked like that of a much older dog. Lily taught us to think positive and that sometimes we need to suffer in silence. Even though she shook in pain, she

never let it get her down. As soon as we went near the leashes, she would spring to life and be ready to go.

Lily taught me that I was stronger physically and mentally than I have ever imagined. I didn't know that I could carry a 70 lb., lanky creature up and down the stairs to go to the bathroom. I didn't know that I could be so patient, but Lily did. When she could no longer lie down on her own, she'd let out a little whine — no matter what time of the night— to let me know that she needed help.

Lily taught my son that sometimes the hardest decisions are the right decisions. When Lily started to have more bad days than good, we knew it was time to let her go. Lily showed me just how brave I am. At the clinic, I just wanted to scoop her up and run home. But, Lily knew that we couldn't go home and she just leaned up against me for comfort. As I held her in my arms, in between my tears, I told her over and over how much I love her, but she already knew that.

Lily taught us so much and for that I thank her. We miss her.

Popo's) toys, carry them around the house, and hop up and down while squeaking them. When Coz plays, he seems much younger than seven years old! He is full of energy, but is no stranger to lounging.

Coz's new family will have to be diligent with teeth care. Coz had nine teeth extracted during his dental in December. He is doing well, however, and does not seem to be in pain. He loves to squeak his toys and munch on treats. Coz is currently on pulse therapy, which means that he takes an antibiotic for five days every month. He will likely need this for the rest of his life to maintain his teeth. The antibiotic seems to help his teeth and some of the breath issues we encountered when we got him. His new family will need to be committed to brushing his teeth daily. He has also been eating some chews from the vet that are specialized to aid in oral hygiene. Coz does fine with having his teeth brushed. It's not his favorite activity, but he tolerates it. We crate Coz during the day when we are at work. Although he didn't like it the first few days we had him, he now does terrific and will go right in when you say "kennel" (Coz also knows "lay down," "no" and "treat"). Coz also traveled to Aberdeen, South Dakota to see his foster grandma and her hound Brady over the holidays. Coz did extremely well during the 5 1/2 hour car ride, behaving like a perfect dog. He didn't cause any trouble like his foster sister, Popo, who raved after the trip how wonderful the Christmas cookies tasted and how she couldn't believe all the presents she got to unwrap. Although Coz hasn't been around any small children since he's been with us, Coz's former owners said he was very good with kids. While Coz still has ton of energy, he is also a kind, gentle soul who seems like he would be wonderful around kids.

Coz is a happy, energetic boy who will make a terrific addition to any household. He is most often called "Love Bug" and "Cozzie Bear" in our home because he is full of hugs, cuddling, and love. Coz will come up and rest his head on my lap if I'm sitting on the couch or come up and lean against me when I'm standing. Bryant and I are anxious to meet Coz's new family because they have many happy years ahead of them with this terrific hound.

1 TEASPOON GARLIC POWDER
