

The Glass is Half Full

Sometimes it's difficult to resist the urge to view that glass as being half-empty. It's just human nature to focus on the bad things that might happen.

I know how people agonize over the decision to allow general anesthesia for their Greyhound. As bad as it sounds, I am always glad it isn't me. The reason is simple; when someone at my house needs general anesthesia we're either talking about eleven-year-old Kitty or my beloved Shannon. Agreeing to put her under is an extremely difficult decision since Shannon is almost fourteen-and-a-half. It isn't worse than what everyone else goes through; it just feels more frantic.



On August 15, I noticed a lump on Shannon's rectum. The vet, Dr. James Cupp, took one look and said, "We need to take it off ASAP."

Oh my, that was not what I wanted to hear. After quickly thinking it over I made an appointment for surgery the following Monday. When I asked what he thought it could be, he said there were basically two possibilities, and that meant a 50:50 chance of cancer.

Glass half full = perianal adenoma.
Glass half empty = perianal adenocarcinoma.
Pretty poor odds — 50:50.

Another thing I learned from the vet is that if Shannon was male, it would more than likely to be an adenoma. If she were unspayed, the odds would also be better than 50:50. But she is a spayed female and that increased the odds of malignancy.

I began the vigil. I had to make it through Saturday afternoon and Sunday before she had surgery. Then there was a three-day wait for pathology results.

Shannon came through surgery just fine. Although when I came to pick her up, the way she was walking concerned the vet. She appeared to be in pain. He gave her a shot of pain medication and said if she wasn't better Tuesday morning that I should bring her back. But she was feeling better the next morning. And she felt even better Wednesday. Then it was Thursday.... Pathology Day.

It was a hectic day of press checks and blues. I called the clinic several times but the vet was busy. I didn't actually get to talk to him until about 6:30 that evening. The news was good.

The glass is half full! I tip that half-full glass to all of you reading this, "I wish everyone out there the wonderful agony of a fourteen-and-a-half year old Greyhound."

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Portable PVC Exercise Pen

Dog show and agility people have been using metal exercise pens for years. Problem is that the commercial ones are expensive. For about one half of the price of a commercial, metal exercise pen, you can construct this PVC exercise pen, which ends up being slightly bigger.

Each exercise pen consists of 6 panels. We give instructions for two basic panels: the fishnet panel and the barred panel. The fishnet panels are lighter, cheaper to make and give more complete coverage from prying hands that may want to pet the hounds. The barred panels are sturdier, heavier and easier to keep clean.

Materials Needed for 6 Fishnet Panels:

- 24 1/2" PVC Ts (not threaded)
- 24 1/2" PVC elbows (not threaded)
- 11 10-foot sections of 1/2" PVC
 - 24 36-inch pieces
 - 36 12-inch pieces
- 6 3 foot x 3 foot sections of fishnet or mesh (or, thin rope to weave into a net)
- Thin rope or cord to attach net to frame
- 25 plastic cable ties (or wire or garbage ties)
- PVC cleaner and glue

Materials Needed for 6 Barred Panels:

- 84 1/2" PVC Ts (not threaded)
- 24 1/2" PVC elbows (not threaded)
- 19 10-foot sections of 1/2" PVC
 - 96 3.5-inch pieces
 - 54 36-inch pieces
- 25 plastic cable ties (or wire or garbage ties)

PVC cleaner and glue

Step 1: Shop for Parts

We found the necessary parts at a home store (like Home Depot or Hechingers), but a plumbing supply place may be less expensive. The 10-foot sections of PVC cost around \$1.30 each. The Ts and elbows were \$0.15 - \$0.40 each. We found the contractor packs of 10 to be one half the price of buying the pieces individually.



For the fishnet panels, we found a 10-foot by 10-foot decorative fishnet at an army surplus store. Alternatively, any mesh will work. Heck, you could even macrame or weave your own netting on the frame with thin rope or cord.

Step 2: Cut the PVC

Your job will be much easier if all your pieces are exactly the same size. A radial arm saw or power miter saw works great for cutting PVC, especially with a stop-block to ensure all the pieces are the same size. The hand-held PVC cutters also work well, but will be considerably more work.

Step 3: Dry Fit the Pieces

Construct the PVC panels as shown in the diagrams below to ensure you have all the necessary parts for the 6 panels. We found that attaching the fittings to all of the 36-inch sections first was best. Then attach the 36-inch sections into panels using the shorter pieces. Cut extra pieces as necessary. When you're sure you have all the necessary parts, take everything apart again.

Step 4: Prepare PVC for Gluing

You CANNOT skip this step. You must use the special PVC cleaner to prepare the PVC to take the glue. It comes in a metal can with a brush attached to the lid. IN A WELL-VENTILATED AREA, clean about 1 inch of each end of each piece of PVC. Also clean the inside of each elbow and T.


Step 5: Glue PVC

PVC glue dries VERY quickly. You have under 20 seconds to position the fitting on the pipe. You won't be able to twist after that, so be certain that your fittings are properly aligned. The safest way we found to proceed was to glue the fittings to the ends of all the 36-inch sections first, being careful to make sure the fittings on each end pointed the same way. Then go back and glue in the smaller pieces to make each panel.

Step 6: Fishnet Panels Only


Lay the completed panel over the fishnet and cut to the proper size. Tie a cord to the frame and weave through the edges of the fishnet and over the frame to stretch and attach the net. This can take some time. Be patient with it. Alternatively, tie rope or cord to frame and macrame the netting yourself.

Step 7: Connect the Panels



Use three plastic cable ties (or wire) to connect each of the panels to the next. Do not make the last connect to complete the circle. This will be your door. Attach a few cords or extra pieces of wire where this last connection would be made so that you will be able to secure the door in the field.

Step 8: Set Up Your Exercise Pen



Position the panels into a circle.

Optionally, use tent stakes to secure the pen into the ground. Or, use sandbags to secure the pen on a hard surface. Add blankets or



pillows as you'd like. Another good idea is to use one of those outdoor canopies or market umbrellas to provide shade for your hounds.

Enhancements

The following enhancements come from Sylvia Kively of New Hampshire. She attributes them to Kevin Kively.

My husband made an ex-pen using your directions, with a few modifications I thought I'd share with you.

He used CPVC, which is smaller and lighter. To connect the sections, he drilled holes through the pipe and threaded the plastic ties through them to keep them in place. For the door, he inserted eyebolts on both panel ends, and made a rod that fits down through them to secure the door.

Toss Balls



Some hounds love chasing after items tossed for them. Here's one that's easy on your throwing arm and a blast for a hound. They take just a few minutes to make and are very inexpensive.


Materials Needed for 3 Toys:

- 9 feet of rope
- Can of 3 tennis balls

Instructions

1. Place one tennis ball in a clamp or vise.
2. Use a drill with a large drill bit to drill a hole through the tennis ball (one hole on each side).
3. Thread the rope through the holes.
4. Tie a simple knot very near the ball.
5. Knot or burn the ends of the rope to prevent fraying.
6. Tie a second knot near the ends of the rope.





Healthy hound treats


Dogs love treats. But we may be tossing them too many unhealthy biscuits, according to recent statistics released by the American Pet Products Manufacturer Association. Results of a national survey of veterinarians indicates 16 percent of all dogs—and 17 percent of large dogs—are overweight, a condition that can lead to serious orthopedic problems down the road. To keep hounds healthy and in good form, check their weight regularly, never substitute treats for meals, and when you do offer an edible reward, be sure to choose wisely. Use our guide below to find healthy alternatives at your favorite natural products store.

Best Bites			
Treats	What to look for	Notable brands	Caveats
Animal parts (for example, freeze-dried beef liver, pig's ears, bones)	Check for the organic label to ensure you're buying products free from antibiotic and hormone contamination.	Healthy Choice, Nature's Variety	Cooked bones are more brittle and can splinter, so choose raw varieties.
Biscuits	Find a treat that you would eat—or one you'd feed to your children. Look for whole-wheat types with natural preservatives (such as vitamins C and E or rosemary), and avoid sugar.	California Natural, Old Mother Hubbard, Pet-Guard, Solid Gold, Wellness, Wysong	Dogs who are wheat-sensitive should be fed only gluten-free biscuits.
Soft chews	Find ones with added glucosamine (for joint health) and antioxidants; excellent for a pet with an active lifestyle.	Zuke's (HipAction and PowerBones)	Be mindful of the recommended servings on the package and, if you're on a rigorous hike, always have lots of water available.

How To Feed Your Senior Dog

Dogs age more quickly than people do. For example, an 80-pound dog at the age of 1 year is the equivalent of a human teenager, and at 14 years is the equivalent of an 80-year-old. As dogs age, their metabolic rates and activity levels decrease. Consequently, many older dogs require diets that are lower in fat and slightly higher in fiber and that provide healthy levels of high-quality protein, fatty acids, vitamins, and minerals.

High-quality protein in sufficient amounts helps maintain muscle and bodily functions. Slightly higher fiber levels help with regularity, minimizing the risk of constipation. Slightly decreased sodium levels help reduce the risk of hypertension. Complete vitamin and mineral supplementation supplies all the essential nutrients, ensuring adequate levels even if loss occurs through increased urination. Consult with your vet for a specific diet and supplement plan for your aging dog.




Magic Doggie Cookies

Read the whole recipe before beginning.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Line 2 jellyroll pans (these are larger than cookie sheets and have 1 inch sides) with wax paper, cut to fit the bottom only. Place the wax paper in the pan & then spray the wax paper with a cooking spray. Set aside & prepare dough.

Ingredients:

- 4 pounds raw liver (I use chicken liver)
- 7 cups of regular flour
- 4 cups oatmeal (grind to a fine crumble in a food processor)
- 8 Teaspoons of chicken bouillon
- 1/2 to 1 cup of HOT water (to dissolve bouillon)
- 8 eggs, beaten
- 6 Teaspoons of garlic POWDER (not salt)

Dissolve the bouillon in the hot water & set aside.

In a LARGE bowl combine the following:

1. Process the liver until it is mush (or chop very, very finely).
2. Add the beaten eggs
3. Add the garlic powder
4. Add the dissolved bouillon

Stir this mixture until well blended. Add to the wet mixture a little at a time: 1. Flour, 2. Finely ground oatmeal.

If you add the flour/oatmeal all at once, the mixture may ball up into a lump! After the whole glop is thoroughly mixed, spread it out evenly into the prepared jelly roll pans.

Bake for 25 to 30 minutes or till baked clear through to the center. Let the baked goodies cool in the pan a bit, then loosen the dough around the edges, turn the pan upside down onto a bread board, remove the wax paper, and cut into bite-sized squares. I then place the cookies into zip-lock storage bags and put them in the refrigerator for up to 2 weeks. These cookies freeze very well also.

Hints: It is not necessary to food process the oatmeal, but I like it fine so the cookies are less crumbly. Play around with the amount of garlic and bouillon (my Beards like lots of both), but be careful of the liquids--you don't want the mix to be soupy.
